Draw a picture of the Antagonist. List six vivid adjectives that describe this character.

Draw a picture of the main problem in the story. Write complete sentences that accurately describe the problem.

Draw a picture of the solution to the problem. Write a few complete sentences describing the solution.

Write a complete, detailed paragraph that answers the following questions: Why do you think the author wrote this book? What do you think he or she was trying to tell the reader?
